

Your philanthropy achieving results for Science, Innovation and Technology

In 2014 the theme for the Benefit Dinner was Science, Innovation and Technology. Two areas in the College that have benefited from the generosity of donors and companies on that night are the library and the newly opened science labs.

In the past few years the Library has become an impressive learning hub of the College, not only for the students during lunch breaks or before the morning bell but for actual classes using the iPad, Chromebook and laptop class sets of equipment.

Karen Clarke, the school Librarian, talks to us about the recent enhancements to the Library, care of the Foundation.

"I was very fortunate to be granted some money for technology in the library. One of the purchases is a Large Screen TV. The TV is a Panasonic 60 inch. It is mounted on the entrance wall near the archives. It is mounted here due to wiring processes. The TV is attached to a laptop and the TV mirrors what is played on the laptop. It is safely placed in the archives room for security reasons.

"Uses for large screen:

- 1. Teaching: Teachers can use the TV to show lessons and projects to their students.
- 2. Promotions: I use the TV to promote reading with book trailers. I used the TV on Open Day with a Powerpoint with photos of SPC highlights looping continually through the day.
- 3. Old Boy Reunions: Usually the data projector and screen are used but this offers better clarity and scope for photos promoting the reunions.
- 4. Teacher training: The TV can be used as a teaching tool for Teacher Professional Development and outside Professional Development.

"Other equipment that has been bought recently with donations has been the wave tables, chairs and some small box sofas."

Donations to the Foundation have enabled the Science department to purchase new equipment such as data loggers and a remote controlled drone with a high definition camera – in conjunction with the state of the art laboratory facilities in the Kennedy Block which has just been upgraded due to seismic issues. These innovations have created exciting opportunities for engaging all the science students.

On Thursday 13 August the St Patrick's College Choir Con Anima competed against 23 other New Zealand Secondary School Choirs in the finale of the National Big Sing Choral Competition held at the Michael Fowler Centre, Wellington.

The competition ran over three days culminating in a Gala Concert. The concert ended with a combined performance involving all 24 choirs singing Ride the Chariot conducted by Rowan Johnston and a rousing rendition of the National Anthem accompanied by members of the New Zealand Air Force Band.

After many weeks of preparation and rehearsal the choir and director Roger Powdrell were delighted to win a Silver Award.

Con Anima presented a varied programme that was in keeping with the special character of the College. In the first session they sang two settings of the Sanctus and a version of the Lord's Prayer. The first Sanctus was a jubilant contemporary setting by Chris Artley, and the second was the Zum Sanctus by Franz Schubert, composed in 1827 and arranged by Walter Ehret. The Lord's Prayer: Baba Yetu by Chris



Kiagiri with music by Christopher Tin was sung with spirit and ably led by soloist Charlie Winn, pianist Rachel Mc Cabe and percussionists Dexter Tauvao, Joe Alexander and Rachel Hinds.

In the second section the choir presented an arrangement of Deep River, a traditional spiritual accompanied by Fiona McCabe piano, Mark Bobb violin and Daryl Prowse double bass.

The final piece which the choir sang in the Gala Concert was an arrangement of a folk song 'Hol You Han' by Paul Rardin which incorporated a wide range of musical styles including rap and close quartet singing. The 'rappers' were Puhi Samuel and Aaron de Rose and the quartet included Charlie Winn, Stefan Filipaina, Justin Espinas and Ben Anderson. Once again the choir was accompanied by Fiona McCabe.

Con Anima and Mr Powdrell are grateful for the support from staff members Suhanya Green and Lynley Reid in preparing for the competition and are now looking toward their future musical endeavours for 2015 and 2016.



St Pat's 1st XV wins Wellington Premiership title and makes national top 8

FOR THE FIRST TIME SINCE 1995, ST PAT'S 1ST XV WERE RECENTLY CROWNED THE CHAMPION OF WELLINGTON SECONDARY SCHOOL RUGBY, DEFEATING THE DEFENDING NEW ZEALAND AND WELLINGTON CHAMPIONS, SCOTS COLLEGE, BY 19 POINTS TO 8 AT PORIRUA PARK.





On a poignant note, the win was the first since 1995 when 2015's coaching and management team of Glenn Donaldson, John Bishop and Peter Wadsworth were also at the helm of the 1st XV. (Twenty years ago, the final was won against Rongotai College, by 10 points to 5.)

The team were spurred on by passionate support from the patriotic College supporters who drowned out the efforts of their opponents and whose contribution was rewarded by a haka from the 1st XV at the conclusion of the match.

Also of note, the victory was the first against Scots College since 2011, taking SPC's record against Scots to 15 wins from 22 matches played, since 1920.

SPC then progressed directly to the Hurricanes Semi-Finals where they hosted Hastings Boys' High School at Evans Bay Park for the right to play in the Hurricanes Regional Final. The team continued their most successful season, beating Hastings Boys' High School 20–13 in their Hurricanes region semi-final at Evans Bay.

Up 12–8 at half time, the home team conceded an early second half try to find themselves behind by one point for most of the second half. They valiantly held their line, repelling numerous charges by Hastings.

With four minutes to play they finally got their chance to go back in front with a difficult penalty kick. First five Zac Donaldson stepped up and slotted the kick, much to the delight of the Evans Bay faithful.

Almost immediately after the restart, loose forward Kevin Fauatea put the game beyond doubt, breaking through the defence to run 45 metres for the game-clinching try.

The team then travelled to Porirua to contest the Regional final against Scots College in a rematch of the Wellington Premiership final. Unfortunately, Scots College reversed the 8–16 half time deficit to beat St Pat's in the Hurricanes regional final. St Pat's will rue two missed opportunities where errors while crossing

the line cost them crucial tries. Scots, on the other hand, made the most of their opportunities to score two second half tries to take the lead. Fantastic achievement this year with both local teams making the National Top 8.

Remembering Jerry Collins

I can still remember the day Jerry walked in to the school front office holding a can of corned beef to contribute to our annual Vinnies Can Appeal.

Jerry was supposed to be attending a training camp for the NZ Secondary Schools' Rugby team at the Police College in Porirua at the time. He said the team was on a break so he thought he'd drop off his can for the appeal. Jerry loved his school and was a proud Patrician who always gave what he could to a worthy cause.

During his final year at St Pat's, Jerry was selected as a Prefect and Captain of the 1st XV. Selection for national teams meant Jerry was often away from school for weeks at a time but when he did attend, he tried to make the most of the opportunities given to him and loved spending time with his 'boys'.

Jerry was often seen helping out a brother in need, sometimes offering to take boys home after rugby training in his silver Honda Civic and picking them up early the next morning for a ride to school from Porirua. He also loved working with and looking out for the younger students which reflected his desire to become a teacher after leaving college. Jerry even filled out a Teachers' College

application form and sent it through but it was inevitable that his future lay in rugby. Inevitably, his continued selection in national rugby teams kept him from pursuing his dream of becoming a teacher.

Before Jerry left to begin his stint in France after hanging up his All Blacks jersey, he popped into school unannounced to say goodbye. The closest he got to being a teacher was that day when I gave him the opportunity to take over my Science lesson with a Year 9 class. The boys were in awe and hung on every word he said. He didn't give a Science lesson but he did teach them a couple of valuable lessons. Not least of all one of his sayings "Don't envy it, try and be it" struck a chord with the students. The boys enjoyed his wry sense of humour and his down-to-earth nature and I'm certain that of all the Science lessons my class had that year, the one they had with Jerry will definitely be the one they'll remember the most.

Jerry will be remembered at St Pat's, not just for his rugby achievements as an outstanding All Black but as a down-to-earth young man who was generous, kind-hearted and showed a genuine empathy towards his brothers at St Pat's. He will be sorely missed.


KENNEDY BLOCK REOPENED

ON 21 JULY 2015, THE COLLEGE ORGANISED A SMALL CEREMONY TO RE-DEDICATE AND BLESS THE STRENGTHENED AND REFURBISHED KENNEDY BLOCK.


Father Pat Brophy, our College Priest, conducted a short liturgy and then each room was blessed and crucifixes were placed in all the classrooms, laboratories and offices.

The Kennedy Block was closed in November 2014 when this work started and it has been fully strengthened and all the rooms completed refurbished. As a result we have six brand new science laboratories and a new Te Reo Maori classroom and Samoan language classroom plus offices and workrooms. Teachers and students are thrilled with the new facilities.

Justice Denis Clifford, Chairman of our Board of Proprietors, spoke at the ceremony. The Board of Proprietors funded this work



at a cost of approximately \$2.2m. The work was carried out by builders Freer Phillip who did a great job for us.
