In Term 1 Acting Rector Wayne Mills warmly welcomed Year 9 students and their grandparents to the Foundation's Grandparent morning. It was a great opportunity to acknowledge the importance grandparents have with their young grandsons.

Also in Term 1 we commenced the series of Rector's Dinners, a new initiative with many parents and Old Boys issued a personal invitation to attend a small dinner hosted by the Rector.

On the sporting front the Foundation offered hospitality both at the McEvedy Shield in March and then for the Wellington College traditional in May.

In July the inaugural Foundation Benefit Dinner & Auction was attended by Old Boys, parents and past parents. Due to the success of this social event we've already set the date for 2012's Benefit Dinner - Saturday 23rd June 2012.

Planning for the Theatre/Quad redevelopment has progressed with working drawings being prepared. ## How to Become a Donor to the School

BECOMING A DONOR TO THE SCHOOL DOESN'T HAVE TO BE A DREADED EXPERIENCE. THE SCHOOL CERTAINLY WON'T BE CAJOLING YOU INTO MAKING A GIFT.

 $Philan thropy\ in\ this\ school\ is n't\ like\ that.$ 

Previously I suggested people give to a school not because it has pressing needs but because they feel their children and/ or they are having, or had, an education that was special. The School went the extra mile. They also believe the School has visionary leadership. There will be projects to which their gift will be directed, and they are likely to give to a vision of what might be possible in the future.

To give, you need to be asked. Unfortunately, many schools have difficulty asking for gifts; they are in the business of teaching, and asking for support doesn't come to them easily. Yet they'd welcome your support, and often that means hoping you will give spontaneously.

Almost all schools have a Building Fund, registered with the Tax Office enabling gifts given to that Fund to be deductible for income tax purposes. Philanthropy at its simplest only requires you to send a cheque to the School made out to the School's Building Fund. You should retain the receipt you will be sent for tax purposes.

The next threshold in giving is to continue to give something each year. Many schools continue to receive gifts annually from families whose children have long left the school, or from past students who left many decades ago. One school has a past student in his seventies who arrives on his motorbike every June – just before the end of the tax year. He drops off a cheque for \$1,000. This wonderful benefactor then leaves as

quickly as he arrives. He really enjoys doing this for his school.

What helps the school considerably is the planned or pledges gift where a donor, on the proviso that if his/her circumstances require the gift can be varied, it can, will contribute a certain amount each year for a set number of years. Probably the most popular of these is the \$1,000 to \$5,000 pledge to the School Building Fund, paid over five years, tax-deductible.

A variation on the pledged gift is to suggest a set amount (maybe \$200) each year that each child is in the school. So a family with one child in Year 9 and another in Year 7 might make such a planned gift to the School of \$2,000. A great Gift.

The benefit to the School of the planned or pledged gift is that, while all gifts can be varied should circumstances necessitate, the school can plan its building program with confidence when sufficient gifts are pledged. Even in difficult times most pledges are honoured, and additional gifts outweigh the loss of those where donors find they need to defer their payments.

Not all gifts given to schools are made in cash. There've been gifts of real estate, works of art, shares, musical instruments, farm machinery, livestock and grain. One school with which I'm presently involved was recently given an ocean-going yacht for its outdoor ed. program!

It's easy in an article like this to write about 'mega' gifts. Like one of \$2 million, or the school which received an estate worth \$10 million. While these are great acts of philanthropy, we all can be benefactors within our means. Many pledged gifts have been \$15,000; but many more have been for \$1,000. A gift of \$100 a year for five years can cost less than a can of soft drink per week.

The school's building project isn't the only area of need. Teachers, students and technology can be supported via the School's Endowment.

The Endowment is a permanent investment made up of many individual gifts, invested by the school as a portfolio but where each donor's 'Fund' notionally retains its identity. Annual distribution for the purpose designated by the donor is limited to interest earned less inflation (usually 5%), with the inflation factor returned to the Fund. In the following example the donor's Fund, begun in 2002 with \$2,000, earned 6%. So, in 2003 one per cent was returned to it and \$100 funds Time magazine in the school library:

#### The Thompson Family Fund - \$2,020

Established in 2002 by the Thompson family (Jennifer '03); income to fund a periodical in the School library.

The next year, 2004, the Fund earned 6% (\$121.20), which enabled \$101 (5%) to fund Time with the balance of the earnings (\$20.20) returned to the corpus, making this Fund now worth \$2,040.20. Thus the gift retains its real value

A past student, Geoffrey Baker, endowed a half scholarship, as follows:

#### The Geoffrey Baker Fund - \$50,760

Established in 1999 by Geoffrey Baker (Class of '57); income used at the Principal's discretion to assist a needy student who could not otherwise attend the School.

Donors like to have choices. Whether you wish to support the School's facilities for today's and tomorrow's students, or establish a named Endowment Fund for people and programs,

you need to know that the school welcomes your support and would be pleased to help you to make a gift – but only within your means.

Finally, Bequests. The donor who gives \$100 each year to the school can continue that \$100 gift every year, forever, by providing \$2,000 to the school in his or her will.

This bequest will allow a Fund to be established in the Endowment where the interest earned on that \$2,000 will provide, every year, net of inflation, an indexed \$100 towards school projects. You may suggest the purpose for which you'd like that \$100 applied each year.

Philanthropy can be fun and tremendously rewarding, personally. Why not try it?

Excerpt from 1959's Patrician by departing Rector Fr J A (Jack) Mannix SM to those leavers of 1959 ... Perhaps each of you could make your own the sentiments expressed by Craig Larkin's oration this evening. But it is not the feeling of loyalty that you have tonight that are the test of your worth; the time of testing lies ahead. The school has done for you what you have allowed it to do. As Old Boys, do what you can for it. Try to remember that though you be doctors, or lawyers, or carpenters, or plumbers in later life, you all have in common the prior vocation of being Christian gentlemen; and in the way you measure up to that vocation lies your true worth as Patsmen. God Bless you all."

### FROM ART TO SCIENCE

## IN THIS ISSUE WE INTERVIEW OUR ENGAGING AND ENERGETIC SCIENCE TEACHER MAT'T BAYLISS.

Teaching was not on Matt Bayliss's agenda when studying at Victoria University for his Bachelor of Science in Environmental Science. In fact, after graduating, he was employed at the NZ Food Safety Authority working in the product contamination area for exports.

Embarking on his OE to the United Kingdom with future wife Miriam, Matt worked for 3 ½ years for the Oxford County Council. An experience as Matt recalls, " if you've ever watched the TV show "The Office' that was the unfortunate type of administrative environment I was working in, but it did help with paying off my student loan."

Proposing to Miriam on top of New York's Empire State Building they returned to New Zealand for a summer visit and it was during this period that Miriam and others kept making suggestions about how Matt should consider becoming a teacher.



"It wasn't until some others had sown the 'teaching' seed that I started to consider it. I had an art teacher in 3rd form (Year 9) at Hutt Valley High School who was great but the following year I struggled with a teacher who was dismissive and who had the unfortunate ability to really have a negative impact on what we thought of our own abilities," Matt explained.

Back in New Zealand for the summer Matt had an interview for Teachers' Training College in Karori and started studies 12 months later. Completing his studies in 2008 the first College Matt applied to was St Pat's. "In fact it was the only job I applied for, I came in with my application, spoke to the Rector's secretary Gerardine Parkinson, bumped into Br Matt (who is Head of Science) and so by the time I came back in for my interview the ice had already been broken".

"As a teacher I want students to feel engaged and hopefully what I do and how I do it will make a tangible difference in their lives. At school I was reticent; in the classroom I enjoy our young men asking the questions. I wasn't raised a Catholic but was brought up with values and spiritual beliefs.

The Marist ethos of taking care of each other and the world we live in is evident here daily at St Pat's. The type of students graduating is a reflection of the care and nurturing provided by both staff and families during the five years these young men are here."

Matt continues, "Current thinking is that this is the first generation where the majority of students are truly disconnected from nature in a fundamental way, which is of major concern."

So if you visit Matt's lab you will notice the bean plants growing, the plans to work with the College's technology department next year to build planter boxes for vegetable gardens in the courtyard adjacent to his classroom windows, all a reflection of continuing the Marist spirit of taking care of your own. And for those students who don't have 'Mr Bayliss' as their teacher he is the one often seen running around organising the School Dances and Taylorfest, which in his own words "are an outlet for my artistic interests". A great combination!

#### RUNDLE Bede 1950-54

Bede was one of only a handful to be awarded the SPC Dux twice. This avid scholar was awarded a MA Degree (First class Honours at Victoria University) and then did his postgrad Doctorate degree at Oxford. Bede taught at Trinity College, Oxford for 40 years, published six books over 37 years and is survived by his wife Ros and children.

#### WHITEHOUSE Noel 1936-38

Family, faith and service to the community was the hallmark of Noel. His university education was interrupted with WWII service in Italy but he returned to complete his law degree and then raise a family in Levin. Found in a second hand shop after the closing of the old College Noel purchased one of the chapel's holy water fonts. Recently the family kindly donated the font back to the College for restoration and eventual use in the College chapel.

#### **OLD BOY COLIN O'NEIL**

Congratulations to Old Boy Colin O'Neil (1956-58) for being inducted into the Wellington Sports Hall of Fame. Colin, nick name 'sleepy fox', played senior club rugby league for Marist in 1959 at just 16 years old, represented Wellington province in 1963 and was selected for the Kiwis in 1967 playing hooker. Being

appointed Kiwi captain 1969-1970 he toured with the Kiwis in 1971 to Great Britain and in 1969 was simultaneously awarded the NZ Rugby League 'Player of the Year' and the Wellington Sportsman of the Year. Colin now lives in Queensland and attended the College 125th Jubilee celebrations last year.
